From the Director's Desk, Erica Christianson

Community partners are an essential part of our Library. We work together with a wide range of partners on everything from collections to displays to even the beautiful landscaping at the front of the Library. We value all our partnerships – many of these groups we have worked with for decades.

This year we are celebrating a special anniversary with one of our partners. Ten years ago, the Lake County Astronomical Society (LCAS) reached out to ask if we would be the pilot site for a circulating telescope

collection. We had been working with LCAS to offer the very popular Astonomy Under the City Lights viewing events. As a result of that collaboration, LCAS thought we would be a great fit for the telescopes. We were excited about bringing this new collection to our patrons, and the success of our telescope lending program led us to develop and grow what would become our Library of Things collection. We continue to partner with LCAS and proudly serve as a host site for Astronomy Day, their annual signature event. Turn to page 3 and 6 to learn more about LCAS, our telescopes and Astronomy Day.

For over two decades, we have partnered with AARP to bring free tax assistance with a focus on assisting low to moderate income families and individuals. In 2023, AARP tax preparation volunteers at the Ela Library assisted over 660 families and individuals with their tax returns. Tax assistance takes place on Saturdays, and registration is required. The Lake County Clerk's Office partnership also extends back decades. We have long-hosted precincts for Election Day voting and have served as an early voting site several times over the years. This year, the Library is an early voting site for both the primary and the general elections. This means that you will be able to take advantage of early voting when visiting the Library or even after hours—the Library may be closed, but you can still access the Meeting Rooms to vote.

Partnerships like these benefit, strengthen, and enrich our community. We look forward to continuing to work with all our partners to provide you with expanded access to information, services and programming.

BORROW A TELESCOPE LOANSTAR LENDING TURNS 10!

It's been 10 years since the Lake County Astronomical Society (LCAS) purchased three Orion Star Blast telescopes and modified them for use as "library telescopes." Back then, Ela library was one of three lucky Lake County libraries to pilot the LoanStar program which allowed Library users the opportunity to borrow a high-powered telescope.

"As of 2024, we now have 16 partner libraries in the program," say LCAS Vice President Tony Yelk. And, although the program has expanded, the goal to promote interest and participation in astronomy has continued to remain the same.

Beyond the LoanStar initiative, LCAS and the Library's partnership has continued to grow. From moon gazing in front of the Library to Astronomy Day held annually in May, these events and others have provided a fun, family-friendly, handson approach to learning for all ages. We asked Yelk to share his thoughts about LCAS and stargazing around Lake County this spring.

Astronomy Under the City Lights is a program we've hosted for years with LCAS. What do you (or LCAS members) love about this community event?

Outreach is a major focus at the Lake County Astronomical Society. The Astronomy Under The City Lights program brings telescopes and other equipment out to the public who might not be able to see the stars and planets with equipment like this. It's especially rewarding for our younger patrons who marvel at the view through a telescope. It's one thing to see pictures in a book or online but to see, for example, Saturn's rings with your own eyes is an awesome sight and honestly a lot of fun to share with people!

Where do you plan to view the solar eclipse on April 8?

That's a tricky question! Unfortunately, for the Midwest, and Illinois in particular, the average chance of a clear day in April is only 50%. Tracking the weather in the days leading up to the eclipse will be critical. The path of totality passes through the southern tip of Illinois through the center of Indiana and into Ohio. Determining where the clear skies will be will determine

where I go. For the 2017 solar eclipse, I was in southern Illinois, but this time around, I'll be chasing clear skies. A total solar eclipse is truly an event that you can't describe with words. You really need to see it to understand how incredible it is. Best of luck to everyone traveling to see it!

Are there any other note-worthy sky spectacles we should watch in 2024?

Absolutely! On August 12, the Perseids meteor shower peaks and is best observed after midnight. Saturn will be in opposition (the point in its orbit where the Earth is between the planet and the Sun) on September 8 and thus will rise at sunset. Viewing about two hours later should be excellent. While the concept of a "Super" Moon is debated on September 18, the Moon's orbit will be closer to the Earth making the Full Moon appear slightly larger than normal. Jupiter will be in opposition (the Earth will be between the Sun and Jupiter) on December 7 which should make for great viewing too!



It takes a village to make the Library work. Our non-librarian support teams at EAPL play a vital role in the success of our organization. Ela Library's IT Department is always working to create more efficient ways to provide top-notch service for our staff and community.

What are the most challenging aspects of your job?

I think the most challenging aspect of our day-to-day operations is balancing the differing needs of both staff and the public.

What are some of your day-to-day responsibilities?

Our main responsibility each day is to make sure both our staff and public IT infrastructure is working properly so that technology is up and running as intended. This often means checking on and maintaining our networks, computers, printers and copy machines. Additionally, we analyze any technology upgrades and make sure we are ready when those changes come.

How has the Library's technology changed over the last 10 years. What's the future look like?

Technology is constantly changing and evolving. We recently upgraded the sorter and the server room which includes all new switches and server hosts. Last fall, we upgraded the network for staff and the public, installed an all-new Zoom conference room, upgraded a new patron print system that enables credit card payment, and installed new staff and public computers. Looking ahead, we will upgrade internet service speed for both staff and the public. We are always evaluating new technologies that would benefit everyone using the Library.

What is the best part of your job?

Working with our incredible staff.

What is one project you are most proud of completing this past year?

We take pride in the significant enhancements we've made to our server infrastructure. Our efforts have led to comprehensive upgrades across all facets of our server and network equipment within the Library. These upgrades, already implemented or in the pipeline, not only enhance the efficiency of our services for both our staff and Library users but also minimize downtime. This investment ensures that we remain agile and adaptable to evolving needs as time progresses.



Where are some of your favorite spots in Lake County to stargaze?

Personally, I like the Volo Bog State Natural Area in Ingleside, Illinois. The Lake County Astronomical Society meets there monthly, and it is far enough away from the bright lights of Chicago to get a good view of the night sky. I look for places that are open because trees can block your view of objects that are low on the horizon. Fortunately, the Moon and planets are easy to find even in bright areas so local parks work well, too, as long as parking lot lights don't get in the way.

Do you have any advice for amateur astronomers?

Never stop looking up at the night sky! Even in areas with a lot of light, you can still see the Moon, planets, and brighter stars. You can follow the planets along their celestial path every clear night. Just like amateur astronomers in ancient times, you can learn a lot from just watching how objects move night after night. Don't think you need a lot of expensive equipment to get started. A basic starchart or smartphone app
