HVAC Renovations Expected in Late Winter/Early Spring

This winter, we will replace many components of our HVAC system that have reached the end of their useful life. This includes our chiller which will be replaced with a more energy-efficient unit. As specified in our 10-year facilities plan, the project is funded using reserves – no new taxes. We anticipate that there will be very minimal disruption to the public during the project.

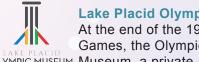

The 1000 Books Foundation launched their project in 2013. The goal was to promote reading to newborns, infants, and toddlers. The American Academy of Pediatrics also encourages parents of new babies to read aloud to them each day and strengthen the relationship between caregivers and children.

Inspired by this, the Children's Department began their own program on Jan 2, 2016. Our goal is to encourage families to make reading a routine. The best way to ensure a child has the skills necessary to learn to read is having someone read aloud to them. Reading together supports both early literacy skills and language development. To date we've had more than 125 kids complete the program!

It might seem overwhelming, but reading 1,000 books to your child before kindergarten can easily be achieved. Just one book every day for three years equals 1,095 books! And by the time you're done, your child will have heard so many stories, learned hundreds of new vocabulary words, and built a love of books and reading that will last a lifetime.

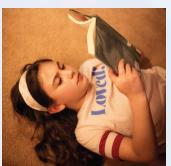
Want to join our program? Here's how it works:

- Show your Ela Library card at the Children's Desk and complete a short registration card for your child (ages 0-5).
- Receive a log to keep track of your reading and a free tote bag to carry all your books.
- Read whatever books you like. You can check out books at the library or read books from home. Read new books or old favorites, read the same book again and again—all reading counts!
- Complete 1,000 books, then pick up your t-shirt prize and take a photo with our finisher sign.
