This edition of *Footnotes* highlights the Ela Library Board of Trustees. The Ela Library is a district library governed by a seven-member elected board. District trustees generally serve four-year terms, following the off-year election cycle (2021,

2023). In May we welcomed two new trustees and are delighted to have taxpayers represented by trustees who are both committed to the excellent service patrons have come to expect at the Ela Library, as well as committed to ensuring taxpayers receive excellent value for their tax dollars.

Our fiscal year runs July 1 through June 30 per state law. In June the Board approved both a balanced budget that includes no tax increase for the next year: the levy was held flat. In addition to their prudent financial oversight, we're still providing 5-star service, the 12th consecutive year of such recognition.
