

From the Director's Desk, Lauren Rosenthal Celebrating 50 Years!

The Library is delighted to celebrate 50 years of sharing the joy of discovery! In 1972, a Project Plus grant was given by the state of Illinois to fund a referendum, and in 1973 residents voted in favor of creating the Ela Area Public Library District. The District encompasses nearly the entire

villages of Lake Zurich and Kildeer, along with most of Hawthorn Woods, and good portions of both North Barrington and Long Grove. Celebrations are planned throughout the coming year, so we hope you'll join in!

Printing & Copying Improvements

Upgrades to our printing, photocopying, and faxing system are coming this spring. One new feature of the system is that Ela card holders will be able to access their annual \$20 print card fund using their library card number. No more having to request or keep track of a sseparate card! This does mean that once the new system is in place, your old print card will no longer work.

INTERIOR RENOVATION UPDATES

Creating Spaces With Broader Functions

Progress continues on the Library's interior renovation. Most of the interior has remained unchanged since the building was constructed 20 years ago, so we're making some much-needed improvements.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN PHASE 1? CURRENTLY IN PROGRESS

Improved Public Conference Room. We're moving the Board Room to the second floor and opening it up for Ela cardholders needing a space for at least four attendees. The new Board Room will also be a Zoom Room, with an integrated experience for audio conferencing, wireless screen sharing and video conferencing.

Additional Program and Meeting Room in the Children's Department. We've noticed scout troops and medium-sized groups can struggle to find meeting spaces, so we're adding a meeting room in the Children's Department.

Improved Children's Service Desk. A new Children's Service Desk will be stationed closer to the entrance of the department, so staff can welcome and assist everyone who visits.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN PHASE 2? PROJECTED TO BEGIN THIS WINTER

Improved Materials Return. The material sorter that handles our close to one million returned items annually is at the end of its useful life and we are no longer able to acquire replacement parts. We've purchased a new-and-improved sorter and are rotating it 90 degrees so the intake slots are right next to Checkout, immediately visible when you walk into the building.

Additional Work Rooms. As we continue to expand the Library of Things collection with large objects such as snow shoes, cake pans, and a metal detector, we need more (and more functional) work spaces to store and retrieve all these wonderful items. However, while we'll have new staff spaces, any furniture or equipment that's in good condition will remain in use in the re-done areas (Meeting Room A is currently storing furniture for re-use). The Library prioritizes spending tax dollars only on what's truly needed, so if it still works, we'll keep it working.

EXPECTED COMPLETION

This project is expected to be completed by summer of 2023. The entire renovation is funded using reserves as specified in our 10-year facilities plan – no new taxes.







Support Your Library!

The Library receives most of its operating revenue from local property taxes, plus some grant and state tax money, and revenue from operations such as passport processing. To best serve our residents, we look for additional revenue sources wherever possible to lessen the burden on local taxpayers. The Ela Public Library Foundation assists in this goal.

The Foundation encourages you to consider planned giving opportunities, which enable you, as the donor, to receive financial and tax benefits. There are many options you can consider with your estate planning or tax advisor. The most common way to make such a gift is through a bequest in your will or trust. Retirement assets also make a wonderful gift because they pass tax-free to the Foundation.

Those aged 70½ or older can direct their IRA administrator to make qualified charitable gifts to the Foundation which can reduce your income tax liability.

The Foundation partners with the Library. The Foundation Board of Directors is happy to work with potential donors, including those who wish for their gifts to be used for a restricted purpose.

As a 501(c)(3), the Foundation enables the Library to apply for more grants. Most grantors require that recipients be qualified 501(c)(3) non-profit organizations, or they may have a policy against funding tax-supported institutions, but will provide grants to foundations.


3D Printed Toys for Tots 2022



With the help of 3D printers, donations from the Library's crafting groups (ELQT / WULZ) and resources from the non-profit Together We Rise,

EAPL's first MAKE-A-Difference event made a big impact with participants looking to give back to their community.
